LEED: Why Use It & What Is It?

The Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Rating System promulgated by the US Green Building Council is transforming the building industry nationwide. The core structure of the rating system itself, its variations as developed for different market sectors, and the protocols for registering and certifying building projects using the LEED System will be reviewed. The impact of this tool on the design delivery process, the impact of LEED Certified building ratings on market valuation of properties, and the challenge of correlating the incremental capital investment expense for LEED Certification against long-term savings in facility operation and the measured benefits of building occupant performance will be illustrated. Finally, the positioning of the LEED Certification system within the larger social, economic, and environmental issues which comprise green, sustainable and regenerative design will be described.

Building Green – and Platinum in Northern Indiana: A Case Study

The seminar will focus on the experiences and hurdles of constructing a building with the goal of achieving a platinum rating from the U.S. Green Building Council. Merry Lea Environmental Learning Center of Goshen College engaged the Rocky Mountain Institute, a design team of architects, engineers, landscape architects, wastewater engineers, and contractors in a concerted effort to achieve the platinum rating. Construction of phase one began in the spring of 2005 with occupancy in April 2006. The seminar will include the key design features for optimizing energy performance at the 60% level, and six months of data on energy consumed and produced.

Green Roofs for the City County Building and for Kettler Hall at IPFW

Students in an advanced Construction Engineering Technology class investigated what they could do to make Kettler Hall, IPFW's oldest building, more energy efficient. They set out to see if they could achieve 50% savings in energy use; they accomplished 52%! That means reducing energy operating costs from \$400,000 per year to just less than half that amount. Students will present research on renewable energy sources to fund IPFW's campus and their plans for a green roof for City County Building in Fort Wayne.

Green Interiors for Commercial and Residential Builders
